Fifth on the list is that a leader should resolute determination to surface and confronts issues and conflicts with openness and candour balanced with diplomacy and empathy. To add on, there should be some form of 'accountability', which is defined as embracing ownership of actions, decisions, and commitments and should persist to see a leader to see who is up to par with his or her ordeals.

Furthermore, a genuine leader is one who has the desire to serve others; putting service ahead of self interest.
